Union Hotel redevelopers, Matt McPherson and Liam Burns, have announced that they have signed a contract to buy the building next door at 78 Main Street. "The acquisition of 78 Main Street enables greater flexibility in our planning to include additional first-floor retail space, additional hotel rooms and suites,

and meeting space," McPherson said. Burns explained that a narrow alley separates 78 Main from the Hotel, and the buildings will be connected at some distance back from Main Street. The view of passers-by will be blocked by "some sort of an atrium" so the two buildings will still appear to be separate. They will share an elevator. Plans call for reviving the Union Hotel as a 50-55-room hotel, with some of those rooms located in the annex next door. Burns says the building is not crucial to redeveloping the Hotel, but it's a big help. He notes that now the project will be "protecting not one, but two historic buildings." 78 Main Street was built in 1881. The next Hotel update in a future issue of the newsletter... Fast Facts About Trash and Recycling Pick-Up in Flemington



Here are the facts (otherwise known as "the straight scoop") on trash and recycling disposal and pick-up in the Borough:

When are trash & recycling picked up? Trash is picked up every Thursday; recycling is picked up every other Thursday. When must I have my trash and recycling at the curb for pick up? By 7:00 AM on Thursday (but no earlier than 5:00 PM on Wednesday, per Borough Ordinance, Chapter 25, Section 3. Note that the Ordinance also provides that cans must be off the street by noon on Friday.)

What happens when a trash or dual collection day falls on a holiday? When collection day coincides with the following holidays, pick up will be made on the following day (Friday): New Years Day, Memorial Day Observed, Independence Day Observed, Labor Day Observed, Thanksgiving Day, Christmas Day.

How much trash and recycling may I put out? For trash, households may dispose of up to 10 (ten) 30-gallon bags plus 2 (two) bulk items per week. For recycling there is no limit. Separate containers are required for trash and recycling. For convenience, recycling containers are available for purchase for \$10.00 at Borough Hall (see the ad on the following page). (Note that trash and recycling are collected by the same company but in two different trucks.)

What qualifies as a bulk item? Most household items qualify, except the following:

- Construction material (plaster, sheetrock, lumber, cement blocks, etc.)
- Hazardous materials such as paint, varnish, herbicide, pesticide, mercury/ thermostats, pool chemicals, asbestos, gasoline, kerosene and anti-freeze
- Refrigerators and air-conditioners
- Large limbs and tree stumps
- What items may be recycled?
 - Glass, regardless of color
 - •Aluminum and steel food cans
- Plastic items labeled #1 or #2
- Paper, cardboard, newspapers, magazines, phone books and junk mail that is not plastic-coated

Recyclables may be co-mingled. Please take care to secure paper items and lightweight plastics so that they don't blow away.

What about lawn waste (grass clippings) and tree branches? How do I get rid of that stuff? Grass and other soft clippings bagged in large, brown paper lawn bags (available through the Borough), and tree branches of a suitable size to place in a chipper, may be placed curbside for pick-up by our Public Works Department. Our staff collects these items every few days. Note that we will not pick-up tree stumps, logs and branches too large to chip. Use your best judgment regarding item size, or call Public Works for assistance (782-2390).

How can I dispose of the stuff that I can't put out as trash or recycling?

Here's a list of some of that stuff and the associated companies/organizations that will accept it (as of the printing of this issue):

- Batteries, alkaline Now considered safe to dispose of in trash
- Batteries, rechargeable Lowe's, Home Depot, Staples
 Cell phones Staples
- Batteries, car Home Depot, auto parts stores
- Long fluorescent lighting tubes accepted on hazardous waste collection days at Hunterdon County Complex, Route 12, Flemington (must be wrapped in newspaper or in original carton)
- CEL's (compact fluorescent lambs) Louis's Home Debot II
- CFL's (compact fluorescent lamps) Lowe's, Home Depot, Ikea
- Prescription drugs (human and pet) Justice Complex, 65 Park Avenue, Flemington
- Air-conditioners and refrigerators (doors removed) Warren County District Landfill, \$15 per item
- Hazardous waste Hunterdon County Complex 3 times/year (next collections: July 13 & November 9, 2013 from 9:00 AM 1:00 PM)
- Electronic equipment Hunterdon County Complex, 2 times/year (next collection: October 12, 2013 from 9:00 AM 1:00 PM)
- Eye glasses Lions Club
 Clothes hangers Tirpok's Dry Cleaners
- Shoes Barkley's Gourmet, Main Street, Flemington (sorted in shoeboxes those in good condition go to someone in need for a small fee, with partial profit to Doberman Pinscher Rescue of PA)
